

Stewardship Season – May 2012

Creation, relationships, money and talents: these were the four themes during the course of our Stewardship Season in May, and if you missed any of the reflections, you can still find them on the Church's website at 'recent teaching.' <http://priestfield.org.uk/recent-teaching/podcasts/>

The aim over this period, through both Sunday studies and the two evening meetings, was to give our membership a broader understanding of 'stewardship,' a deeper understanding of our congregational finances and a brighter vision of our mission. When inviting people to invest themselves in projects, or when raising money, it is always right to ask the reason why. It is only justifiable if we can show how this effort and money will further the ministry we believe we have within our community and beyond. It seems to me that we are beginning to see, perhaps still in small ways, the fruit of the thinking and planning we did together over the first couple of years of my time at Priestfield. The effort and expenditure are, under God, beginning to be effective.

One of the major financial lessons we can learn from this Stewardship Season is that we need to do as much as possible to keep a lid on rising costs and maximise our general income. The Kirk Session and Finance Committee are thinking about ways in

which we can achieve this, but we will not succeed in that without an increase in our general giving. David Douglas indicated that, in the near future, we need in the region of 25% more on a regular basis for us to break even on our projected budget (which is not an overly ambitious budget). I invite you to consider prayerfully how, over the next couple of years, you might contribute to that need.

The Session is very realistic about our situation and knows that there are some of our members who might be 'capital rich but revenue poor' – they may have significant assets but less in terms of regular income. If you are in this situation, please remember that, for the mission of our congregation to continue beyond your time, you could leave the congregation a legacy. We can give to God in death as well as life.

Over the course of the next few months, the treasurers will keep you in touch with our situation for 2012, and how we are placed in relation to the necessary work taking place to renew the interior of the building to suit the opportunities of our time.

Queen Elizabeth - Diamond Jubilee

By the time you read this, our 'Garden Party' celebrating Queen Elizabeth's Diamond Jubilee will be over, but the national celebrations will continue throughout the year. Whether you are a monarchist or republican, as Christians we can celebrate the impact for good that our Queen has had, not only in our own land but across the globe. She has done so without hiding her strong Christian faith, and even where we may think she has made a wrong call, it was probably made with a good intention.

I find it hard to believe that someone as old as I am (not elderly, but no spring chicken!) has lived his entire life in the reign of only one monarch. Yet behind this apparent stability there lies dramatic development. Over the course of this sixty year period that began in the shadow of WWII, times have changed almost beyond recognition. Politically and technologically we are living in a different world. National borders have been redrawn, regimes have come and gone, wars have started and finished and there is now more computer power in the average car than took Neil Armstrong to the moon.

In this journey through change, the Queen has spoken often of how her faith in God has been a mainstay of her life. As I reflect over the course of my lifetime under her reign, I can say the same. 'Great is thy faithfulness' – these are not only the words of a hymn but a personal experience. As we celebrate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee, let us also celebrate the goodness and providence of God that we have known over these years.

Olympics – Saturday 28 July

'A once in a lifetime opportunity.' That's certainly how it seemed to us as we applied for tickets to some of the Olympic events in London. Initially, along with millions of others, we thought we had lost out, but in the end we were able to buy tickets for two events: a diving final at the aquatic centre and a football semi-final at Wembley. The excitement is mounting, and we are looking forward to it.

But the Olympics provide us with another kind of opportunity – to share in imaginative ways something of the Good News of Jesus and the race that is the Christian life. As part of our Olympic celebration there will be a special event for all the family in the Church garden on Saturday 28 July. Look out for more details soon, and use this as an opportunity to bring others so that we can celebrate together the life God offers us.

29 February 2012

TryPraying

David Douglas reported on the arrangements for TryPraying during Lent.

Student Training

Jared gave further information about the forthcoming student placement which would run from June to September 2012. The student is Dan Harper, currently based at Richmond Craigmillar Church, where his wife is a Parish Worker.

Palm Sunday

On Palm Sunday afternoon Newington Churches Together would be arranging a March of Witness from the Methodist Church in Nicolson Square to Craigmillar Park Church.

Maundy Thursday

St Peter's Episcopal Church would be joining with Priestfield for the Maundy Thursday evening service.

Summer holidays

Jared would be on holiday from 4 August for three weeks.

Reaching Out...

Fiona outlined the arrangements for the production and distribution of Easter Cards.

GodSpace

The Kirk Session had previously agreed that the 10.30 am all-age services will run at least until September 2012. Recent adjustments have included Jared himself addressing the children for the first part of the service. This has ensured a single unified theme for both parts of the service. The GodSpace leaders for the week have led the children's prayer as well as running activities in the Lounge.

Messy Church

The group had also developed proposals for a 'Messy Church' on Saturday 7 April 2012 (Holy Saturday). Much planning was still required but the basic structure of the time was outlined. The Kirk Session approved the proposals and agreed a budget allocation of £300 to be met from the outreach budget.

Refurbishment

On 7 February Presbytery had given approval to carry out of the dry rot eradication work, including re-plastering and redecoration at a provisionally estimated cost of £30,000; to apply to the General Trustees for assistance of £5,000 from the Central Fabric Fund; and to apply to Historic Scotland and the Heritage Lottery Fund for a grant.

Student Ministry

Andrew Drysdale explained a proposal that Priestfield should become a 'Fairtrade' Church. This would require;

- The use of Fairtrade tea and coffee after services and in all meetings for which the church is responsible,
- Moving forward on using other Fairtrade products such as sugar, biscuits and fruit,

- The promotion of Fairtrade principles and products during Fairtrade Fortnight and during the year through events, worship and other activities whenever possible.

The Kirk Session agreed the Group's proposal that Priestfield should become a Fairtrade church and instructed the Social Life Group to ensure all the church's consumables are Fairtrade, wherever possible.

28 March 2012

Baptisms

Jared reported that the baptism of Caitlin Symington would be on 22 April and of Cora Hilliard on 13 May 2012.

Presbytery

The Clerk reported that Presbytery had approved the 'Presbytery Plan 2012 - 2022' at its meeting on 20 March 2012.

Internal Ministry

The Group raised the lack of welcome given by the entrance from Marchhall Place and the corridors and stairs. Following discussion the Kirk Session instructed the Fabric Group to undertake the following work, in advance of the commencement of dry-rot eradication work and the need to move services to the upstairs hall;

1. Undertake plaster repairs to the rear corridors and stairs,
2. Arrange the redecoration of the corridors and stairs using volunteers,
3. Install a cross on the corridor wall as a symbol that the building is a church,
4. Install a fixed permanent screen in the upstairs hall.

Refurbishment

Jared reported that the General Trustees had awarded the congregation a grant of £5,000 towards the dry-rot eradication work, provided the proposed work was to the satisfaction of their architect. The grant application to Historic Scotland/Heritage Lottery Fund would be considered on 19 June although, if successful, there would be a further process of securing firm tender prices before the exact details of an award would be known. In this eventuality it would be late summer or early autumn before work could start. The Structural Engineer would be checking the temporary works to ensure that they were still adequate.

The design and costing of the Lounge and front entrance works was progressing and periodic progress meetings were taking place with the Architect.

The Clerk reminded elders that the Kirk Session had approved, in principle, the creation of a 'prayer corner' at its meeting on 26 October 2011. After discussion the Kirk Session;

1. Approved the creation of a 'prayer corner' in the south-east corner of the chancel,
2. Confirmed the location of the lectern and angel/font in the prayer corner,
3. Confirmed that the 'prayer tree' should be securely fixed within the prayer corner,
4. Agreed that additional space should be created by the removal of two sections of pew,
5. Instructed the Fabric Group to bring forward proposals for an area or areas where buggies and wheelchairs could be located.

Furnishing

A wheelchair is now available in the north vestibule. This is on loan from the St Andrew Ambulance Association. A pillow and blanket had been donated and they would be kept with the chair.

Membership: Jen Cresswell

The Kirk Session admitted Jennifer Cresswell to membership by special resolution.

Membership: Ron and Laura Wellwood

The Clerk reported that he had received a letter from Ron and Laura advising that because of continuing health issues they were no longer able to undertake their roles as elder. They also indicated that they wished to move from the congregation. The Kirk Session noted the position, appreciated their years of faithful service and elders were encouraged to remember Ron and Laura in their prayers.

24 April 2012

General Trustees Grant

The General Trustees had advised that their architectural advisor is satisfied as to the method of eradication of the dry rot and that a grant of £5,000 is now available.

Membership

The Kirk Session admitted Stuart Clark to membership by special resolution.

Stewardship Season

Jared outlined the format of the Stewardship events. They would begin with the rationale for stewardship. The Treasurers would then give figures of the present situation and the role of general and special giving would be discussed. The third element would look at the congregation's mission and the place of the building within those mission plans. Jared also detailed his stewardship themes for the four Sundays in May.

Election of Representative Elder to Presbytery

The Kirk Session elected Norman Henderson as representative elder to Presbytery for a further year from 1 July 2012.

Reaching Out...

Fiona Ferguson outlined the key points and recommendations including a Queen's Diamond Jubilee Garden Party on Saturday 2 June and an Olympics Garden Party on Saturday 28 July.

Messy Church

Jared reported on the successful 'Messy Church' event on 7 April. About forty people had been involved. It had been exciting with lots of activities and worship had involved the retelling of the Holy Week and Easter story. The food in the upstairs hall had been very good indeed. It was hoped to have more Messy Church events. Fiona added that the costs had been contained within the £300 approved budget. The banner, paints and other supplies would be used at future events.

Student Ministry

The Group proposed that students would arrange a lunch for the congregation following the morning service on Sunday 20 May. Any profit would be given to Christian Aid.

Fabric

Ian Williams reported that an Energy Consumption Report had been completed. This showed a reduced carbon footprint with 38 tonnes of CO₂ in 2011 compared with 40 tonnes in 2008.

Scripture Union **es-team** (Edinburgh Schools Team)

Isabel Murray outlined the work of SU in schools. The Session agreed to invite a member of the **es-team** to speak during a Sunday service.

Ian and Isabel Murray: Sabbatical Leave

Ian and Isabel would be out of the country from July through to early 2013 and the Session noted that they would not be able to undertake Session and other duties during this period. They were thanked for their contributions to the life of the congregation.

Next meeting of the Kirk Session.

FINANCIAL STEWARDSHIP

At the recent Annual General Meeting, we went over the accounts of the congregation for 2011 and saw that, for the third year in succession, we had shown a deficit.

The deficits would have been much bigger and really unsustainable if Presbytery had not reduced substantially the amount we were asked to contribute to the Ministry and Mission Fund (MMF). Over these three years we have actually paid an average of £37,000 to the MMF and Presbytery Dues. This compares to a figure of £46,000 which, I am advised, is the amount that is required to define a congregation as self-financing.

The running costs of the building and our own activities in the Parish amount to £36,500 per year, or £700 per week assuming no unusual repair costs.

The average weekly givings in the last years amount to £930 each week and, with the gift aid claims and other income, this reaches £1,300.

Assuming we ignore Special Expenditure and that we want **to reach self-financing status, we need to increase our regular income by some 23 per cent.** For the four months to the end of April 2012, our offerings have increased from £16,100 to £18,290 but this does include an extra Sunday.

The income figures exclude the two Gift Days held in 2010 and 2011, which each raised some £16,500, excluding Gift Aid. If even part of this giving could be transferred to Ordinary giving, we could reach our target. It does, however, leave us with a need to consider how we could deal with Special Expenditure.

THE STUDENT YEAR

Throughout the session our students have met for a 'Bring and Share' lunch on Sundays sharing conversations and discussions as well as food. For their last Sunday as a group, they shared lunch with the congregation, preparing soup and sandwiches and raising over £130 for Christian Aid.

Another popular activity was also connected with food – cooking events. With the help of experienced cooks from the congregation, students discovered how to make a variety of budget meals based on sausages and on mince, as well as baking shortbread and mince pies. Some international students joined in to sample these very British dishes.

FRESHERS IN SEPTEMBER

We aim to continue our mission to Freshers by again having a presence in the Pleasance and in the Chaplaincy Centre during the Freshers' Fair and following this up by meeting students in Pollock Halls using the advertising table in the dining complex later in September.

FRIENDS INTERNATIONAL

FI is again organising Edinburgh International Outreach (EIO) - 4 weeks of mission in July, seeking to reach out to the many international language school students who come to Edinburgh. It is based in Carrubbers Christian Centre in the High Street. Christian students, mainly from around the UK, volunteer to lead the mission. Accommodation is required for them in two week slots. Cooks are also required to prepare evening meals. **If you can help with either of these, please contact June Henderson (667 4823) for more information.**

Prayer Points:

1. Pray that those who have finished their studies are guided by God towards the next stage in their lives.
2. Pray that those who return are refreshed, having had a relaxing summer, and ready to meet the challenge of the next step in their courses.

3. Pray for language school students arriving in Edinburgh over the next couple of months, that EIO will be able to make contact with them.
4. Pray for Christian students to become team leaders of EIO and for offers of accommodation for them.
5. Pray for those international students who have become Christians here and are now returning to their homes where their new faith may cause problems with their families.
6. Pray for the Student Ministry Group now planning for next session.

'Whose We Are and Whom We Serve' is not only the Guild motto but will also be the title of our new strategy for the next three years, from 2012 to 2015. For the first year, 2012/2013, which is our 125th Anniversary Year, our Theme will be '**A Faith to Proclaim**'. Since the Guild was founded in 1887, Guild members, past and present, have openly been proclaiming their faith to others. It has always been our aim to make others aware of our faith, and to have the confidence to share our faith with them. As Christians, we are supposed to go out and preach the good news but it's hard to decide the best way to do that. It so happens that our Discussion Topic for 2012/2013 is entitled 'BEING CHRISTIAN IN TODAY'S WORLD', which is closely linked to our Theme and will give us lots of scope for discussion.

So, we have 'A Faith to Proclaim' – but before our Guild members have a sudden panic attack – they are not being asked to go round the parish with a sandwich board strapped to their backs!! We can proclaim our faith in works and in life choices and actions. By helping others, caring for the sick, teaching and educating those in need, and giving to the poor. People will see we are Christians by the music we listen to, the songs we sing, attending Church

regularly, taking part in and supporting Christian events. But is this enough?

There are so many questions we should ask ourselves. How difficult is it for us to listen for God's voice in our busy, noisy lives? How easy do we find it to be different from everyone else, and is it easy to stand out from the crowd? Have you ever been in company or worked in a place where you were the only Christian? How did you cope with it?

Is your faith so strong that it influences the lives of your family and friends? Do you find it difficult to invite someone to come with you to Church or to the Guild? If so, why? How do you think that you demonstrate your faith in God in your life? How do you feel about speaking about your faith, especially to non-Christians?

With the Olympics happening this year, our Projects and Topics Committee have suggested that we should imagine we are running a relay, carrying the baton of Faith. Having been given it as youngsters ourselves, we are now passing it on confidently to the next generation. Have we a winning team?

We have 'A Faith to Proclaim'. Let's do it!

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Prayer and Meditation ~

God's reward system



"... HE WILL RECEIVE HIS REWARD."

1 Corinthians 3:14 NIV

How will God evaluate and reward what you did for Him during your lifetime here on earth?

Based on three tests:

(1) **The relationship test** - The life God rewards is not a life of performance apart from relationship with Him. Jesus pointed out that unless you abide in Him and obey His commandments, you will not bear fruit for Him (*See Jn 15:5*). He commended the church at

Ephesus for their good works, then turned around and condemned them because they hadn't kept their love for Him alive. "I know your works, your labour, your patience...Nevertheless I have this against you, that you have left your first love" (*Rev 2:2-4 NKJV*).

(2) **The motive test** - Jesus said to the Pharisees, "Take heed that you do not do your charitable deeds before men, to be seen by them. Otherwise you have no reward...in heaven" (*Mt 6:1 NKJV*). Note the words "to be seen." What should our motive be? To serve God and bring glory to Him! Even simple things like eating and drinking can do that (*See 1Co 10:31*). On the other hand, your most religious actions are worthless if your motive is to enhance your own ego and reputation.

(3) **The love test** - Christ said, "Love your enemies, do good, and lend, hoping for nothing in return; and your reward will be great" (*Lk 6:35 NKJV*). When it comes to good works, why is always more important than what.

The Bible says,

"Look to yourselves, that we do not lose those things we worked for, but that we may receive a full reward."

(*2Jn 8 NKJV*)

So keep your heart pure and your motives right!


